Use of new PenPals handwriting scheme for all pupils. Writing short, scientific and not-so scientific explanations

Can you recall the events of Peter Pan? Can you identify the rhyming words in the story? Can you discuss the words that best describe the different characters? Can you create a map of Neverland using the descriptions in the book? Individual reading books Can you blend and segment using your phase 2, 3 and 5 phonics? Can you read your sentences fluently? Can you recall events from your story?	
Sharing the novel, Peter Pan, on a daily basis - recording phrases or techniques we have enjoyed, discussing predictions and ideas of what might happen, feeling inspired to write, draw or talk.
